Throsby Park Handover 26th September 2010

The Historic Houses Trust became the owner of Throsby Park, Moss Vale, on 26th September 2010, an acquisition that marked the HHT's 30th birthday. The property was transferred from the National Parks & Wildlife Service, which has owned it since 1975. The HHT will conserve and lease Throsby Park through the Endangered Houses Fund program.

Throsby Park was acquired by the New South Wales Government and reserved under the National Parks and Wildlife Act in 1975. As part of the purchase, the State Government agreed that Miss Del Throsby and her mother could reside in the rear section of the house. The National Parks and Wildlife Service undertook extensive restoration work at a total cost of more than \$2 million including reinforcement of the roof, underpinning the building, repairs to internal floors, walls and ceilings and electrical rewiring. Del Throsby continued to run the Throsby Park Riding School, which was established in 1934. Mrs Throsby died in 1977 and on 1 July 2006, Del passed away in the paddock feeding her much-loved English riding pony, Peter. Del's death ended five generations of family occupancy of Throsby Park.

Throsby Park has embarked on a new chapter as a property of the Historic Houses Trust, managed under its Endangered Houses Fund, which conserves historic properties and returns them to community use under long-terms leases. In June 1945 the S.C.E.G.G.S. group of Schools produced a magazine entitled "Lux - Jubilee Number" to celebrate the Jubilee



Christ Church Bong Bong



of modest proportions. As it stands on Church Rd, Moss Vale, overlooking the site of the long defunct village of Bong Bong, Christ Church's architectural lines are austere and strictly functional, showing little embellishment. However, the church's interior is a marvel that sparkles, demonstrating the inspiration of colonial artisans and contemporary heritage conservators. Its intricate restoration has just won the 2010 award from the National Trust of Australia (NSW) for Heritage Conservation of Interiors.

Over forty years ago George Throsby, a descendant of the Highlands pioneering Throsby family asked Moss Vale lawyer, Robin Croker, to become a warden of the church. Wardens are responsible for the upkeep of church buildings and grounds. At the time, Throsby did not know that he would die a year later, nor that his request of Mr Croker would lead to such a magnificent restoration.

It is a church that almost wasn't built. In 1836, a committee of trustees, including the pioneer settler of the district, Charles Throsby, was tasked with building an Anglican church in the Moss Vale area. For years the trustees vacillated over plans, but Throsby wanted a result. In 1845, he paid £701.4.6d for the church to be built on his own land using plans by the colonial architect, John Verge. On 31 December of that year, the first Anglican Bishop of Australia, W.G. Broughton, consecrated it. Throsby was not only a philanthropist, but he also knew how to get things done.

A donation of £400 in 1880 by Charles' widow, Elizabeth, enabled the first major renovation work on the church. This included the ornate interior decoration that has been recently restored.

Charles died in 1854 at the relatively young age of about 55. Elizabeth lived to age 87, after raising seventeen children. Six of her sons are buried side by side in the Christ Church Cemetery. She regularly attended what she must have regarded as her church.

It is dearly loved still. Painting of the church's exterior was completed nine years ago, overseen by Robin Croker and Sally Darling. This also entailed the removal, repair and cleaning of the stained glass windows. But more was in store. In 2009, church wardens Croker, Margo Merrett, David Edwards and congregation member, Harry Blackboro, undertook to revamp the interiors using heritage conservators from International Conservation Services. The works cost in excess of \$100,000. The church congregation contributed a small proportion, with the bulk provided by an anonymous benefactor. The little church has a habit of attracting generous benefactors with deep pockets.

Attention to detail is what makes the restoration remarkable. The conservators scraped the paint surfaces to investigate how the church had looked through its lifetime. One of the scrapings has been left exposed to display a layered history through time. The conservators' delving discovered far richer and ornate decoration than the church's 2009 appearance. They decided to restore the interior to its full former brilliance. Scaffolding was installed to repaint the ceilings in what Mr Croker describes as "a Moss Vale reenactment of Michelangelo painting the Sistine Chapel". Decorative detail on the walls such as fleurs-de-lis were discovered and reinstated, as were gilt lettering, highlights and motifs. Removable varnish was applied to protect the surfaces and lighting installed to illuminate the intricate beauty of the restored interior. The visual impact of the work is stunning.

The restoration can be seen every Sunday at 9.30am during services.
